History of the Places of Worship and Cemeteries of Township of Fairfield

Fairfield Dutch Reformed Church

Fairfield Dutch Reformed Church is a historic church on Fairfield Road in Fairfield Township, Essex County, New Jersey, United States. The congregation was established in 1720 by Dutch settlers. Receiving recognition from the Classis of Amsterdam, it became the twelfth congregation of the Reformed Church in America in the state of New Jersey. The building dates to 1804 and was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1975.

The first state school building in Fairfield belonged to the Fairfield Reformed Church. During the first 85 years, the congregation worshipped at the present corner of Hollywood Ave. and Fairfield Rd. Its first building, a structure of log, mud, and stone was destroyed by fire in 1744. A second octagonal building was used until 1805. At the turn of the century, it was decided to erect a new church building 1/2 mile north of the old one. Made of brownstone from a Little Falls quarry, the new structure was constructed in 1804. Several decades later a tall white steeple and a balcony were added. Today the congregation continues to worship in the same historic building and the tall white steeple remains physically prominent in the community.

St. Thomas More Catholic Church

St. Thomas More Parish had its official beginnings on December 3, 1962, when Reverend Patrick F. Joyce, pastor of St. Aloysius Parish in Caldwell, NJ, was assigned the task of initiating a parish for the Catholic families of Fairfield due to the increasing number of Catholic families in the Fairfield area and the great distances to the nearest Catholic churches. The masses were first held at Fairfield Elementary School. The parish acquired its first building on 144 Hollywood Avenue to convert a former private home into a rectory with a chapel occupying part of the basement. Construction on the new church, school, and hall began in March of 1964 and the church was opened for its first mass on Easter Sunday, 1965.

This collection of early inscription records of the Fairfield Reformed Church Cemetery includes inscriptions from unpublished reports dated 1895 and 1904 as well as other sources. The interments are conveniently listed in alphabetical order by last name. In addition to vital records there are human interest items, some relevant wills and census information. There are deaths caused by a barn fire, a couple killed in a carriage accident and a pastor thrown from his horse. Many early records are said to have been lost in fires. To provide some additional history of the church a record of the pastor up to 1902 is included. Personal data on these gentlemen includes a pastor who was active in the Revolutionary War and was once a prisoner of war at the Old Sugar House in New York. Also included is information about two men who served in the War of 1812 and twenty men who served in the Civil War some of whom were interred after 1904. The Fairfield Reformed Church, Fairfield, Essex County, New Jersey is listed in the New Jersey Register of Historic Places and the National Register of Historic Places. (NR Ref. #75001134) Fairfield was early known as Gansegat and Horseneck; then, Caldwell Township in 1798 and renamed as Fairfield Township in 1964.
